About this booklet

Citizens' Budget 2015-16 presents the Provincial budget in simple language, making it easy for common citizens to understand how the budget impacts their lives. The first ever citizens' budget in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa was published last year (2014-15) by the provincial government. It's publication again this year is a reflection of the Government's continued commitment to not only improve citizen's access to budgetary information but also to promote accountability and transparency in managing public finances.

Citizens' budget complements the Right to Information Act 2013 and the Right to Services Act 2013 by enabling people to effectively exercise their right to public scrutiny of state representatives, access to information and provision of quality services. It is expected that the information provided in this document will empower citizens to hold elected representatives and public officials accountable. This will contribute to good governance and effectiveness of public budgets in addressing the needs of citizens.

What is budget?

Budget is a government's plan that explains where the money is coming from (revenue) and how it will spend that money (expenditure) during a period of one year for the public good. The Government of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa prepares its budget for a twelve month period starting from 1st July to 30th June (also called a fiscal/financial year).

The Constitution of Islamic Republic of Pakistan, 1973 makes it compulsory for the provincial government to prepare and present the budget for approval of the Provincial Assembly before the start of a financial year.

The budget document is an important link between citizen and the state. People pay taxes to the state so that in return it can provide them with the services such as education, health, social safety net and security etc.



Budget process

Budget is the key tool for government to translate its policies into action.



Types of budget

- 1 Current budget is the money allocated for routine activities of the government and consists of salaries and non-salary items such as utilities, fuel, purchase of assets etc.
- **Development budget** is used for new activities, such as building of schools, clinics, roads, water and sanitation projects etc.

Both current and development budgets are essential for delivery of continued quality services to people.

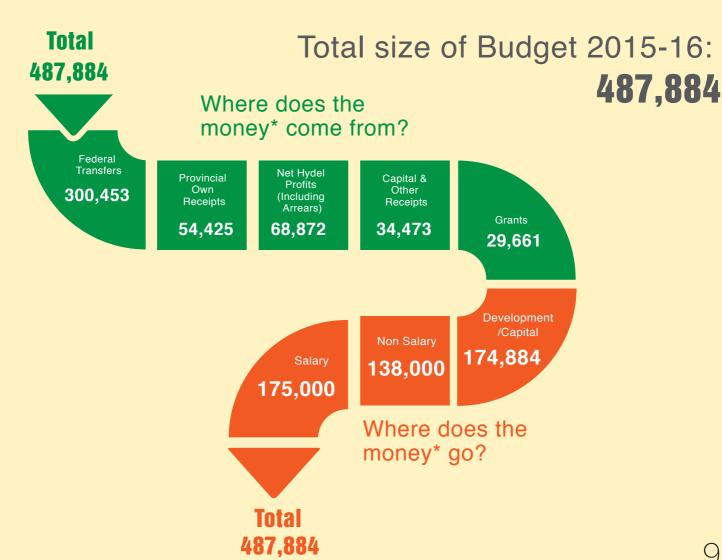

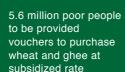

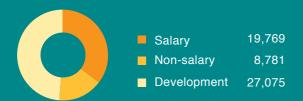


Enriching lives through education

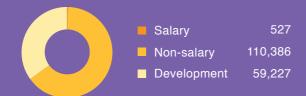

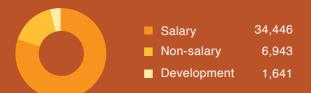

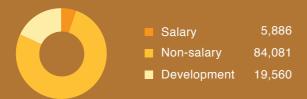
